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DEPUTY PRINCIPALS' REPORT







ACCURATE INFORMATION

Parents need to inform the school if there is a change in personal details, particularly address, phone and mobile numbers as well as email addresses. On numerous occasions we have tried to ring parents only to find that the number has been changed or disconnected. In an emergency this can be very frustrating. Additionally, parents get frustrated when they discover that emails containing important information such as semester reports or parent-teacher interviews have also not been delivered. Please contact the school directly whenever your contact circumstances change.

SUBJECT SELECTION FOR YEARS 8, 10 AND 11

Students in Year 10 are well underway finalising the process of selecting their subjects for the senior school with the deadline for their online submission being Wednesday 12 August.

Year 8 students will be given information about electives for Year 9 during Term 3, with an Information Session for parents and students in Week 6. Students will have to submit their elective choices online by 1 September. More information will be provided closer to these dates.

Students in Year 11 will also receive additional information about other HSC options this term. In particular, this will be for subjects including Mathematics and English Extension II, as well as Extension History, Japanese and Music. Students looking to discontinue courses and reduce their units of study, will have more information and opportunities to also do this. Students and parents alike are encouraged to remind themselves of our eligibility benchmarks for these courses.

YEAR 12 EXAMS AND BEYOND

The written Trial HSC exams begin on Monday 10 August and finish on Friday 28 August (weeks 4-6). Practical tasks for Visual Arts and Design and Technology continue in the weeks following. All Year 12 students return to regular lessons on Monday 31 August and are required to attend every lesson up to the end of third term (unless otherwise arranged for the completion of major works in Design and Technology, Visual Art and Music). Every lesson is important right up until Thursday 24 September as teachers are using this time to complete syllabuses and revise the courses. Information about the last day for Year 12 (breakfast, farewell assembly, luncheon), the HSC exam, misadventure appeals, signing out, scholarship applications etc will be issued at a special Year 12 meeting during Week 7.

VISUAL ARTS AND MUSIC EXHIBITION

Unfortunately, due to Covid-19 restrictions we have had to cancel our annual showcase for Year 12 HSC Music and Visual Art. We are looking at other ways to highlight our talented HSC students and we will provide information as it is available.

UNIFORM

A reminder that students are expected to wear correct school uniform to school each day. If there is a reason a student cannot wear a particular item of uniform, they are to bring a note signed by a parent to the Head Teacher Administration or one of the Deputy Principals in the morning before Roll Call/READ. Blazers are compulsory in Terms 2 and 3 for the whole school.

If students need extra warmth, then the school jumper may be worn under the blazer. Hoodies are not acceptable under any circumstances.

Sports uniform is to be worn on Wednesdays (Sport Day) and black tracksuit pants are not acceptable. Students in Year 12 who are not currently participating in school sport can wear full school uniform on Wednesdays, particularly if they have outgrown their sports uniform.

The election process for the 2021 SRC has begun. Nominations for Year 12 SRC 2021 opened Monday 3 August.

Intelligence V Persistence

"Will great intelligence or great persistence impact on your son's success at school and into the future?"

In my research I found that overwhelmingly the characteristic of persistence was a staggering seven times more significant than intelligence as a determinant of a child's achievement. Professor Charles Desforges from the University of Exeter in the UK states that persistence is not a trait we are born with but one that can be learned and that parents, rather than teachers, are the people most likely to impact on a child's persistence.

Persistent adolescents do some or all of the following:

- They stick at task until the end.
- They set goals and work toward them.
- They generally focus on tasks and are not easily distracted.
 - They don't let failure stop them.
 - They are more likely to take risks as learners.

There are many ways you can encourage your child to persist and some of these I'm sure were practiced during our recent Isolation and home schooling. They all revolve around MODELLING, ENCOURAGEMENT and VOCABULARY.

As a parent think how you:

- 1. Model persistence on a daily basis so your son sees what persistence is
- 2. Actively foster and promote persistence so your son sees it is possible
- 3. Develop a vocabulary about persistence that your son hears routinely so that persistence becomes part of your son's frame of reference.
- 4. Catch your son being persistent. Make a fuss when he sticks at a task regardless of his success so he knows that it is something you value.

Let's remind every Tech student that in the words of Calvin Coolidge "Nothing in this world can take the place of persistence."

STUDENT DROP OFF/PICK UP

Due to the increased traffic around the school with many more parents dropping off and picking up their sons due to COVID-19, traffic conditions in Anderson Street have become too dangerous for students plus local residents have complained about the increased traffic. It has been decided that if you are dropping off your son in the morning and picking him up in the afternoon, then you must do so at Ethel Street ONLY.

Students will be directed out the Ethel Street Gates in the afternoon.

Please be aware of local residents in Ethel Street - do not park across driveways and be aware of their privacy.

CAREERS REPORT



Due to Covid 19, Careers has been forced to cancel various events. One of these events was the primary source of information for parents regarding university applications. This was our University Admission Centre (UAC) presentation. This is the application process for students wishing to gain admission into university.

Parents and students of Year 12 should be contemplating the universities that they would like to attend and the five course preferences that they will include in their UAC application. The application and the application fee needs to be submitted and paid by 30 September. You then have access to the 'Check and Change' facility on the application. This allows you to alter your choices as many times as you like without any additional charge.

Also attached to the UAC application is the Schools Recommendation Scheme (UAC SRS) which is an early entry scheme and Educational Access Scheme (UAC EAS) which offers adjustment factors.

The UAC application is for universities in NSW and the ACT only. If your son is wishing to apply interstate they will be required to fill in a VTAC form for Victoria, QTAC for Queensland and so on.

Information regarding scholarships will be included in the weekly careers newsletter - The Oracle.

REPORTS

Term 3 is the halfway mark to another school year, one which we will never forget. With Year 11 students being the last year group to receive their reports, I would like to take this opportunity to congratulate those students who have shown improvement and given their personal best in Semester 1, especially during the remote learning phase last term. The Year Advisers have had conversations with each individual student about academic progress and performance with some students having had a separate interview and letter sent home to plan ways they can improve in each subject. Our top 20 achievers from each year group together with students who have demonstrated important efforts to improve will also be rewarded with a special lunch celebration, organised by their Year Adviser.

EDUCATIONAL ACCESS SCHEME

Each year UAC offers a scheme known as the 'Educational Access Scheme' to those students wanting to apply for university who have experienced long term disadvantage at school in Year 11 and 12 for a minimum period of six months. A presentation to Year 12 students will be held in the Wellbeing Assembly, in Week 3, to inform students about the scheme as well as highlighting some new categories and changes for making an application online.

Year 12 students who require a school endorsed application in the form of an educational impact statement (EIS) will be told they have until Week 8, Term 3 to organise with the appropriate staff member to have this section completed so that a completed EIS can be returned in time for students to scan and upload their forms before Graduation day on 25 September 2020.

ENGAGING DISPLAYS HELP STUDENTS GROW AS READERS

Pulling in reluctant readers by giving them a sense of comfort with something they already know is a stepping stone that we offer to enable students to move into more difficult books. Graphic novels are not just "comic books" like many parents remember but have moved into being sophisticated works of both art and literature. Respected authors such as Ta Nahesi Coates, Neil Gaiman and Alan Moore are writing for Marvel and DC as well as pursuing other writing projects. Our latest display asks students to get involved in the debate of who has the better characters, storylines, villains or redemption arcs?

To choose a side, we encourage students to read a few of each. Many have seen films but they argue strongly for one side or the other.

WHAT KIND OF SOURCES SHOULD I BE USING TO DO THIS ESSAY/RESEARCH PROJECT?

Part of our role in the library is teaching students the best way to find accurate and reliable information. To evaluate sources, students are asked to use the CRAAP Test.

C - Currency: Is the source up to date? If not, does it matter for the purpose of the essay? Does new evidence differ?

R - Relevant: Does the information from the source relate to the question being asked?

A - Authority: What are the author's credentials that qualify him/her to write on the topic? The URL should reveal something about the source: .edu, .gov, .org, .net

Example: Medical advice from a doctor/researcher or an Instagram influencer?

A - Accuracy: Is the information from a trustworthy and reliable source, supported by evidence that has been peer reviewed? Is the language unbiased and free of emotion? Is it the truth or "false news"?

P - Purpose: What is the purpose of the article being used? To inform, to sell something, to persuade, to entertain? This will require you to evaluate if the view is objective and impartial or opinion/propaganda.

It is important for students, especially our seniors, to be able to access academic articles. Sites such as Google Scholar provide access to academic articles for a price. Students are encouraged to go to the NSW State Library website to join for free, which gives them access to thousands of academic journals, historical maps and archives, books, magazines and newspapers. These resources are all free to students who hold a library membership so sign up today! Students should also understand the validity of peer-reviewed articles in academic journals. This means that the writer, an academic studying or teaching at a university, researched a topic or did an experiment. To be published in an academic journal, there is a strenuous



process for the writer in which other academics from around the world have to assess the validity of the writer's claims before the article can go to print so scientists judge the work and make sure the process was followed correctly. Students need to move from using Wikipedia, an online encyclopaedia which can be written by anyone without credentials, to using references that are more sophisticated and academic in nature.

CURRENT EVENTS—ENGAGING DISPLAYS

Our library tries to stay current so that students can always find the latest novels and nonfiction. This month we have a special display, 'Black Lives Matter' amidst the protest marches in our city and across the globe. Books such as *How to Be an AntiRacist, Black like Me, Stamped from the Beginning* and *Just Mercy* were passed around by the students as well as biographies of civil rights leaders, Martin Luther King Jr and Nelson Mandela.
