YEAR 12

ASSESSMENTS


Children's Book Week

Well done to those who participated this year and showed up each week! Thanks also goes to Sumen Ahmed who created the draw and who showed up each week to support the boys.






Intra-School Chess

Preliminary (Year 11) and HSC Study Guides with Past Papers for Loan

Our Year 11 and 12 students can borrow study guides for their HSC and preliminary courses from the library, but they are required to sign a contract as the books range from \$40-\$100+ each. We also



have books in our reference section, which students may use in the library. They often copy a few pages for practising skills. These resources are to assist them in their study of their courses. The library also has books on various kinds of tests such as entry into American universities (SAT) and medicine and law entry exams.





Week 1 of Term 4 was the last week in our Library for our Year 12 2020 students as they prepared for HSC exams. The library was a hive of activity with teachers and students engaged in

HSC workshops, group study sessions and individual preparation. This was the final week on campus for this cohort but we look forward to learning about their successes as they continue their academic endeavours into the future. Having taught many of them in English in Years 7, 8, 9 and/or 10, I was especially sad to see them go.

Borrowing eBooks from ePlatform

Students and staff are able to borrow eBooks in two different ways. First, they can go into the student portal and click on My Library. It will take them to the Oliver library system site. They then need to sign in using their school username and password and to choose their school from a drop-down menu. eBooks can be borrowed for two weeks. Choose from over 10,000 books online, available 24/7. Some find it easier to download the free ePlatform app then to select TECH as their school and sign in using their school username and password.



HSC MENTOR SCHEME

Now that Year 11 students have officially moved into their HSC year, it's no secret that there will be countless demands, challenges and stress placed upon our Year 11 students in their final HSC year. For this reason, the school will be running the HSC Mentor scheme again coordinated by the Year 11 Adviser, Ms Bilton. Organisation for next year's HSC Mentor Scheme is already well underway this term with Ms Bilton matching up interested students from her year group with a teacher mentor. The mentor's role at Tech is to encourage, guide and use their vast knowledge and experience to assist students whenever the need arises. Students have been advised that the Mentor is not a substitute for the normal classroom teacher or traditional support networks that exist via the school's Wellbeing Team. A combination of small groups and indivdualised mentoring will continue for our Year 11 students in order to match up students to their chosen mentor. Thank you to Ms Bilton for all her organisation in getting the scheme up and running and for the volunteering staff who have made themselves available as mentors for our incoming Year 12s.

R U OK? DAY

Tech has been a strong advocate for the R UOK? Day cause for a number of years now addressing mental health issues among our boys. This year we heard from Year 12 SRC leaders. Eric Napper, Dylan Alima, Dae-Yang Nguyen, George Kekatos, Emmanuel Takla and Ajey Aadarsh made an impressive contribution to this year's event at a whole school assembly. The students spoke about the challenges men face when seeking help for mental health issues in today's society and what we as a school community can do to help our mates when things are not okay. The more we understand and accept that mental illness is just like any other illness, the more likely people will

seek help and social attitudes will improve. R U OK? Day is an important event in enabling people to start conversations around this topic. The school were also provided with four simple tips to initiate a conversation (1) Ask, (2) Listen, (3) Encourage Action, and (4) Check to follow up on a friend who you may be concerned about.

The assembly concluded with Mr Cachia paying special tribute to the Anniversary of Ryan Wang who tragically lost his life on his way to school this time last year. On behalf of the whole school community our thoughts and prayers are with Ryan's family and friends during this time.

PEER SUPPORT

On Thursday 29 October and Friday 30 October, all of Year 8 students will participate in the Peer Support Foundation's leadership training where they will be exposed to important skills and strategies around resilience, team work and communication. Coordinated by Ms Pamela Stergiou and facilitated by another 10 dedicated staff, this is a valued program that we then use to identify 60 new peer support leaders who will then take on additional responsibilities in the transition to high school of our new Year 7 students for 2021. At their most recent Wellbeing Assembly, all of Year 8 were informed of the program's expectations and aims as well as their own requirements over the two days should they wish to be offered a place amongst this leadership group.

WELLBEING ASSEMBLIES

Wellbeing Assemblies continue this term for all students with the following events planned for Term 4;

- Year 7: 'Being a Man' How to use feedback from exams to improve overall performance, and Cyber Safety/Games/Social Media.
- Year 8: Peer Support Training, Brainstorm's Production 'The Flipside', and High Resolves 'Videos for Change' presentations.
- Year 9: Exam Preparation/Study Skills, Drug Education Awareness session, and 'What to expect when going into Year 10'.
- Year 10: 'Exam Preparation/Time Management Skills', 'All My Own Work', and a Drug Education Awareness session.
- Year 11: University Pathways, Living a Balanced Life, and HSC assessments

ATTENDANCE/LEAVE

Sydney Technical High School has high expectations of all of its students and this includes their attendance. The school must adhere to State and Federal legislature around this as it ensures all children up to the age of seventeen attend school. The demographics of the students at STHS mean that many are travelling long distances each day and rely on public transport that can sometimes be delayed. In these unforeseen instances, the school is always understanding. Where such understanding expires is when student absenteeism and/or lateness becomes too frequent. Students who know that their transport links are unreliable in allowing them to arrive on time to school every day are strongly encouraged to make alternative arrangements. This may mean walking and leaving home earlier. All students are allowed three instances of unexplained lateness to school every term before they will receive an after-school detention.

Students and their parents are reminded that any leave taken during the school day requires students to bring a note in the morning to the Deputy Principals where an early leave pass will be issued.

Students and their parents are also reminded that where extended leave needs to be taken (ie more than five days) students are required to fill out a special form which they can collect from their Year Adviser or Ms Cohen in the front office. This leave will need to be approved by the Principal.

It has been an honour to represent the P&C over the past three years as President and I thank everyone on the P&C committee as well as all the wonderful parents, teachers and staff who have helped along the way.

Throughout my three years as President, the P&C's focus was on encouraging a closer relationship between the parent community and the school. This generally involved better communication between parents and also with the school (via the various social channels the P&C have established).

SICK BAY AND YOUR SON

If you receive a phone call from the office informing you that your son is unwell and in sick bay, you must attend to this promptly and collect your son as soon as possible.

Your son cannot be left in sick bay for lengthy periods of time.

IMPORTANT HEALTH INFORMATION

A student in our school is currently receiving treatment which results in a lowered immune system. This means that the student is more prone to getting ill from infections. As the student is not contagious but has a chronic illness, it is important that he participates actively in the day to day school program without any major limitations. A major concern is that if this student develops measles, chicken pox, whooping cough or influenza, he could become seriously ill. It is important that we prevent this situation from occuring.

If your child has or may have measles or chicken pox, it is important that you:

- 1. Do not send them to school
- 2. Notify the School Principal as soon as possible.
- Take them to your GP or medical centre to confirm diagnosis if possible.
