

#### return to school

It has been such a wonderful first week back and we are all so glad to see your sons back at school. Greeting them on their way into our grounds each morning has been very positive and the fact that they are adhering to our guidelines and changes to routine has been most respectful.

Our students are correctly wearing their sport uniform on the days when timetabled PE lessons are scheduled for practical lessons. Our students are enjoying each other's company in class and in the playground after so many months have passed.

We wish to remind you that our school rules around the wearing of blazers has not changed. All year round, it is the outer layer garment. If a student is wearing a jumper, it is only if it is underneath their blazer or if they are in their PE uniform. These warmer days and additional PE practical lessons will mean that the students should be getting more active and sweaty than usual. An extra wash cycle of these items each week may be required.

Additionally, students' use of their mobile devices during break times is also not permitted. These break times, in particular after so much time in front of screens during remote learning, must stay in their bags. We ask you to remind them of the importance of this.

Wellbeing Wednesday is still a huge focus and we are strongly encouraging our students to make the most of this beautiful weather and get active in their own way after lessons end and while school sport is still in hiatus.

When further announcements of changes to school restrictions occur, we will continue to keep you all updated. In the meantime, we are most appreciative of your ongoing support of our school community and are very grateful of your efforts throughout remote learning.

#### **Assessments**

School exam periods for Years 7-10 took place online in Week 3 prior to their return to school. Year 11 will have their first HSC assessment week in Week 10 following the conclusion of the HSC exams for Year 12. All Year 11 students have received their HSC Assessment book. Please read the information carefully and make sure you are familiar with the procedures for assessment tasks. All Year 11 students should also schedule a meeting with the careers adviser, Mr Mouzakis, during a study period

this term to discuss their post high school pathway options. Students and parents in Year 9 and 10 must also understand and adhere to our new policy extension requiring illness/misadventure forms to be completed and submitted should an absence occur in the five school days leading up to an assessment block.

#### SRE

Special Religious Education (SRE) otherwise known as 'scripture' may be held later this month however, it is unlikely that this will operate under current restrictions. We will keep you updated. Further details for students will be given through the daily notices. As in previous years, Tech will offer scripture services from approved providers of Catholic, Greek Orthodox and Christian Studies once each term again in 2022. Students' scripture groups are collected at the start of Year 7 each year. Students, with the written permission from their families, are able to opt in/out of scripture groups at any time.

#### Year 12

The rescheduled Year 12 HSC exams will commence this month. Unfortunately, the delayed schedule also means a delayed publication of the results means that our traditional morning tea cannot proceed in 2021. We will instead look at an alternative celebration very early in 2022. The two designated sign out days for Year 12 will follow the conclusion of the exams in early December. We are very glad to be able to provide graduation celebrations for our Year 12 students including our annual luncheon at Doltone House on Friday 3 December 2021.


The Australian Government publishes "Australian Jobs" yearly. This publication provides an overview of trends in the labour market to aid the future job seeker to make informed decisions about the areas of job need. This is a summary of the publication and it is extremely important as it should provide ideas for the destinations of our students.

The Covid pandemic had a significant initial negative effect on the labour market with

employment falling much more quickly than in previous recessions but the labour market has subsequently rebounded very quickly as seen in the next graphic.

From our destination survey of the class of 2020, we can confirm that all our students went to university and the breakdown per industry is shown in the graph below. It shows that all our students chose a career path in the top five employment areas in our State.

As a final remark, this publication is a valuable resource to make sure that your career opportunity clashes with the jobs that will be available in your area.

For our context, youth (persons aged between 15-24) were particularly hard hit by the pandemic. The younger age group was impacted as the pandemic affected the services industries and the university leavers were impacted as they tend to have fewer skills and less experience and are often the first to be retrenched during an economic downturn.

New South Wales is the largest employing state in Australia. Sydney accounts for almost 70% of the state's employment. Greater Sydney has the most highly educated workforce with around 46% with a Bachelor degree or higher.



## Premier's Reading Challenge (PRC)

Sydney Tech has had 51 boys complete the PRC this year! Well done!

The Challenge aims to encourage a love of reading for leisure and pleasure in students and to enable them to experience quality literature. It is not a competition but a challenge to each student to read more and to read more widely. Current rules state that students in Years 7-9 must read 20 books in the year with half of them coming from a list of quality books at their reading level. The reading lists are found on PRC's website. Due to Covid, PRC increased the number of books that students could read "off list" from 5-10 book.

We encourage boys to start reading now for 2022 PRC. Reading logs are found online on the Premier's Reading Challenge site on the student portal, and the library has printed copies of reading logs should students wish to insert them in a notebook to keep track of books read until the PRC officially opens in March of next year.

There are two ways students can access these resources. They can log into Oliver Library (within their student portal) and either perform an Advanced Search or browse the Reading Lists for eResources. Alternatively, they can download the free app ePlatform Wheelers onto their device, select our school from drop-down menu then sign in using their school email and password. Our eResources can be borrowed and returned within either Oliver or the eLibrary and loans made in either platform will be listed under Current loans in Oliver until the item is returned.

10 October was Mental Health Awareness Day. A new addition to the digital Library this year is the Wellness Collection.
