DEPUTY PRINCIPALS' REPORT





SUBJECT SELECTION

Subject selections for Year 10 are currently being finalised. We are currently looking at numbers of students selecting each subject to determine which classes will run and which are not viable.

An information evening for parents of Year 8 students was held on Tuesday 27 August. Subject selections for Year 8 into 9 will need to be submitted by clicking on the link emailed to students by Monday 2 September. The class lists for each subject in both of these years will be finalised early in Term 4. Changes may be made during Term 4 only if there is room in the class students wish to enter.

FINAL EXAMS FOR YEARS 7-10

Year 10 yearly exams will be held in Week 3 of Term 4. Yearly exams for Year 7 will be conducted in Week 4, Year 9 yearly exams will be conducted in Week 5 and Year 8 yearly exams will be held in Week 6. All students should begin to make study notes or revision notes as preparation for these exams. Students should make use of the extra free time they have during the school holidays to help prepare.

YEAR 11 IN TERM 3 AND 4

The Year 11 final assessment period will begin in Week 8 of Term 3, beginning Monday 9 September. The timetable for the exams is currently being designed and will be distributed to students when it is finalised. These tasks are the final assessments for the preliminary courses for all students in Year 11. The beginning of Term 4 is the start of the HSC courses for these students. Official assessment tasks for the HSC will begin in Term 4. HSC 2020 information afternoon will be held on Tuesday 15 October from 5-6pm in the auditorium.

Students need to complete a minimum of 10 units for the HSC. All Year 11 students are to enter their HSC subjects/units by returning the sheet issued to them via email by Friday 6 September to the box in Mr Grinham's office. This needs to include any units being picked up and any accelerated courses undertaken. Please be mindful of the eligibility policy. Changes to subjects will occur in Term 4, from the beginning of Week 3.

Year 11 students who drive to school or are a passenger in a car driven by another student, must see Ms Burgess in Term 4 to collect the correct permission letter. These forms must be completed, signed by parents and returned as soon as possible.

YEAR 12 HSC PREPARATION

Year 12 are preparing for the countdown to the HSC. Exams begin on Thursday 17 October and conclude on Friday 8 November. Students should take on board the valuable feedback provided from the recent Trial HSC examinations in order to make improvements. Students studying Design and Technology, Languages, Music, and Visual Arts have already completed or are about to complete the practical component of their HSC. Year 12 had a meeting last week about the final days of school, the last day (breakfast, assembly, luncheon), the HSC days, misadventure, signing out and requirements for a safe conclusion to their school life. A letter has also been posted home. Further details about the Graduation luncheon will be provided in a separate note.

Slam Poetry Workshop

The Charles Kingsford Smith Memorial Library of Sydney Technical High School Slam Poetry champion Will Small led 50 students from Years 7-11 in a writing workshop on Friday afternoon, 16 August, as part of our Australian Children's Book Council's Book Week celebration. Will Small was our second Artist in Residence for the year, providing a history of hip hop and the spoken word and instructing boys in exercises to find their unique perspective and voice and to get their thoughts down on paper.


Will spoke to the boys about how poetry seemed like something in dusty books to him when he was in school and how most people can only name

poets who are dead. He said that "poetry is a living and breathing art for today" and detailed how his love of hip hop led him to making the choice to be a poet. Will credits his discovery of rapper Tupac with being a defining moment in his love of the spoken word and told students there were four



components of hip hop: the break (beats and mashing up of different genres of music); break dancing over the break of a song; rhyming by the MC/DJ; and graffiti/street art as these forms of expression were about taking their message to the people and "flipping something out of nothing." Much of the hip hop culture was born from people feeling overlooked, misunderstood and different, something teenagers often feel too. The boys studied the lyrics of a handwritten lyric of Tupac, "The Rose that Grew from Concrete," with students recognising the metaphor in the autobiographical poem with the rose representing Tupac and those like him who "flip something out of nothing" and of something worthy and beautiful growing in a poor and desolate area.

Next, Will led the boys in an exercise of "freestyling," done with or without a beat, in which the speaker thinks about their next line as they go. He pointed out the inflections, rhymes and repetition in the famous "I Have a Dream"



speech by Martin Luther King Jr and how hip hop artists often layer spoken word such as King's speech over a beat.

Students then discussed how in any writing they do, it's necessary to communicate in an engaging way. To begin, Will encouraged them to do a daily "word dump" free writing into a notebook or journal and just

writing for a designated time such as 5 or 10 minutes, based on ideas in Julia Cameron's The Artist's Way. This will build fluency, necessary in senior years for timed exams and get their fingers used to writing and their brains wired in stream of consciousness writing. During this time, grammar isn't important but instead getting ideas onto paper.

Students then responded to different stimuli such as photographs, cartoons, music, quotes, etc. Once they'd put some ideas on paper, Will led them through an editing process and told them to scratch out half of the unnecessary words to refine their writing, only leaving the words true to their point or



message. This step is often hardest for students.

Next, students were asked questions and they had to answer. "If you were a piece furniture, what of would you be and why?" produced "I a rocking chair am the corner set in of а room, ready for conversation."

Students really shone in this section, volunteering to read aloud and share their writing. "I am rolling hills reaching to the sapphire sea" and "a comic smile against a dark background" were two examples that students offered.

Will finished by discussing how writing daily can help people to become self aware, a skill that researchers have found is what sets CEOs, executives and leaders apart from others. Write a Book in a Day – a project supporting the Kids' Cancer Council

On Thursday 15 August two teams of Year 10 boys representing Tech worked from 8:30am until the end of the school day and beyond to submit a story of 4000-5000 words with illustrations. Write a Book in a Day is a creative and challenging team competition for students in Years 5 to 12. Teams of up to ten have a day to write and illustrate a book from start to finish. To make it even more fun, unique parameters must be included in the story. Completed books are donated to children in hospitals all across Australia. Funds raised through sponsorship go to The Kids' Cancer Project, a national charity with a mission to support scientific research to help children with cancer. A fundraiser will be held in September to support this cause.

The project stresses collaboration, a life skill that students will need to learn when joining the work

force and in any other aspect of their lives. It is something that some gifted students struggle with as they prefer to work independently. It was amazing to see our boys butting heads about their visions for the books and defending their ideas then compromising to get the project done.



WELLBEING REPORT



OUTGOING YEAR 12 ADVISERS

As the Year 12 Class of 2019 completes their final weeks of school at Tech, it is important that we recognise and congratulate their Year Advisers over the past six years (Mr Lee Roche, Year 7, Ms Eugenie Sugowdz, Years 8-10 and Ms Antoinette Johnston, Years 11-12) on their commitment to the academic and personal development of these students, most of whom arrived here way back in 2014. On behalf of the school community - the many students, staff and parents who have been put at ease with the knowledge that their sons have been working to always give their personal best, I would like to thank you, Antoinette and Eugenie for your hard work and dedication to the wellbeing of these boys over the past six years.

WELLBEING ASSEMBLIES

Wellbeing Assemblies have continued to play an important part in the development of effective wellbeing and engagement strategies for all of the students at Tech.

Year 7: With Peer Support now officially over for Year 7, their new program of wellbeing assemblies has already seen them take part in lessons aimed at avoiding distractions and falling behind. They have also learnt all about overcoming adversity and the skills required to bounce back from setbacks. Mr Andy Cachia organised a Year Meeting at the most recent wellbeing assembly to recognise and celebrate student achievement in the Semester 1 reports. The final assembly for Term 3 will finish up with an R U OK day recognition assembly to spread the message about the importance of checking in on others to ask "Are You Ok" and support a friend who may be going through tough times.

Year 8: Year 8 heard from external speaker Jonny Shannon who spoke about 'Cybersafety' and 'Cyberbullying' and the implications associated with the misuse of technology when online. Year 8 were also in the audience for Brainstorm Production's play – 'Sticks and Stones' – which is a topic that raises awareness about the issues associated with bullying. A Year meeting was also held for Year 8 by their Year Adviser, Ms Anna Steel, where high achievers were recognised and important information about the exciting range of electives available in Years 9 and 10 was outlined to all.

Year 9: Year 9 had a recognition assembly organised by their Relieving Year Adviser, Ms Cheryle Steel, and have started to plan for their camp later in the year to Broken Bay Sport and Recreation Centre. The students also heard from Youth Motivational Speaker, Daniel Merzer, who presented the 'Leader of your Life' session from his 'Get the Monkeys off your Back' Program. A presentation from our Year 9 Deputy, Mr Grinham, on respectful relationships and cybersafety tips was also provided for the students at one of their wellbeing assemblies this term.

Year 10: A recognition assembly coordinated by Year Adviser, Ms Jo Bilton, as well as the production 'Cheap Thrills' by Brainstorm Productions featured at the Year 10 wellbeing assemblies this term. Mr Mouzakis (Careers Adviser) spoke to the boys, prior to the subject selection afternoon, about choosing senior subjects. He also organised an Academic Adviser Day where all students were asked to dress up for an interview to practice interview skills as well as discussing subject choices with staff.

Year 11: In less than 12 months from now, the current cohort of Year 11 students will have just completed their Trial HSC exams – a stressful time for all. They have been approaching the topic of effective exam preparation and stress management. It was fortunate that we were also able to have some past Alumni students from the class of 2018, Alfred Ngyuen, Min Ho and Terrence Qi, share their experiences and tips with the students. Year 11 also heard from guest presenter Tom Reynolds, from the Independent Drug Education of Australia, talk to them about the risks and laws associated with alcohol and illicit drug usage in Australia. Students also learnt valuable first aid skills as part of the presentation. Later this term on Monday 23 September after the Year 11 assessments, NRMA U Turn the Wheel has also been booked. This is a driver education program sponsored and organised through Cronulla Rotary.

Year 12: Mr Jay Dahl, our school counsellor, presented 'Living a Balanced Life' at the last Year 12 assembly before the last two major assessment blocks in an attempt to help our boys get through the next few months of exams and assessments. I would also like to remind any Year 12s considering applying in Term 3 for the Educational Access Scheme (EAS) that if the application requires an Educational Impact Statement from the school then this needs to be finalised no later than Friday 13 September so that we can complete and return your form before Graduation Day. Remember the school must know about your disadvantage for a period of six months or more for us to be able to endorse the application. Currently Year 12 should be working on their University preferences, scholarship applications as well as registering for courses that have a supplementary application direct to the university (medicine). They must also not forget to keep up with their study schedule.

With Year 12 coming to the completion of their secondary schooling, it is now time to look ahead.

Early next year they will enter the sphere of Tertiary Education and all that comes with it, including internships, networking events and finally graduate roles.

Regardless of the university your son has chosen to attend, students must differentiate themselves in order to aid them in getting that elusive role after university. Completing a degree at higher ranking universities (like UNSW) does not guarantee a job in the current day and age. Hundreds of students will finish each year with the same or similar qualifications to your son – so they need to stand out. From the table below, you can see the competition for graduate roles is increasing with more people completing tertiary education.

IMPORTANT HEALTH INFORMATION

- 3. Take them to your GP or medical centre to confirm diagnosis if possible.
