

I encourage all parents to attend if you're able.





Assessments

Year 12 will have their next HSC assessment period from Monday 21 March until Friday 25 March (Week 9). Year 11 will have their first Preliminary HSC assessment period from Monday 28 March until Friday 1 April (Week 10).

Students and parents are reminded to read the assessment booklets carefully, which are located in the intranet under Year 11 or Year 12 Files. As a clear reminder regarding attendance, any student who cannot arrive on time or is absent for a task must phone DP Mr Grinham or DP Ms Peachey at the beginning of the day and when next at school provide a medical illness/ certificate using the misadventure form contained in the assessment booklet. Any student who is absent in any of the five school days prior to the assessment week is also to supply a similar medical certificate.

Year 12 mid-year reports will be distributed early in Term 2. If required and in addition to reports, letters will be sent home to inform parents of students who are causing concern due to their lack of preparation or progress.

Interim Reports

For several years STHS has provided the students and parents of Year 7 with an interim report at the end of Term 1. While not a comprehensive record of student achievement like that of the semester report which will follow at the end of Term 2, the interim report gives parents an indication of the progress their son has made in his transition to high school in terms of his organisation, attendance, socialisation and engagement.

Since its implementation in 2018, a similar process also takes place for Year 11 as they will have interim reports completed by their teachers and provided to their parents indicating how they have commenced in their first term in the senior school. The report will communicate a student's dedication to their studies, organisation, attendance appropriateness of the subject selection. It acknowledges the steep learning curve some students experience in their first term of the preliminary HSC and how communication between school and home can support student achievement and wellbeing.

These reports will be sent home to families at the end of this term.

READ

Sydney Technical High School has a READ program. Reading is an essential skill for all students and is a key predictor in achieving minimum standards in NAPLAN and Band 6 in HSC exams.

READ takes place every day (except Wednesday) at 8:45am for 20 minutes. Every student must bring a physical book (not electronic) each day. Books may be of personal interest or be selected from the Year 7-10 English reading list, the Premier's Reading Challenge list or the Senior Textbook list.

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Special Religious Education (SRE)

For those who wish to attend, SRE is offered once each term on a Tuesday for Orthodox, Islamic, Catholic, and Protestant groups. From Term 2, the school will offer a new Hindu option.

Students have been allocated to SRE groups according to the religious affiliation stated on their enrolment forms. If any parent/carer would like to change the attendance/non attendance of their son please email Mr Grinham prior to the first SRE session in Term 1.

School Photographs

School Photographs will be taken on Tuesday 17 March (Year 7-10 and Year 12) followed by Year 11 on Monday 22 March (in lieu of assessment week). Information will be distributed through roll call classes.

The preferred method of payment is online but payment to the photographers on the day will also be accepted. All students are to be photographed whether they are purchasing or not as the photos are used for student ID cards.

The schedule for the day will be on noticeboards around the school. Year 12 must have their portraits taken in their school blazer.

Welcome to the BandTime program. This letter outlines key information regarding joining the band in 2022. Students are able to join the band and learn an instrument with no prior experience.

<u>Lesson Fees</u>: \$205 per term with on-time payments eligible for a discount. These are collected prior to the beginning of each term. An Annual fee option is also available. <u>Instrument</u>: Each student needs his own instrument. Options through Engadine Music include purchasing and renting with a buy-out option. If your son is interested in joining the band there are a few steps to take:

- To register your child's interest via an online application visit <u>www.engadinemusic.com.au</u>
 Click on the Bandtime tab and follow the link to Join The Band. Click on Sydney Technical High
 School to complete the form. Registration and instrument preferences must be completed by
 Friday 4th March, 2022.
- 2. Also located on this page is the "Welcome to the band" video presentation, it is recommended that parents and students watch this together prior to joining to see demonstrations of each instrument. The instruments available for students to choose from are:

- 3. On the registration form students will be asked to select 3 instruments they would like to play. BandTime staff will assist with appropriate instrument choices for their size and characteristics based on information supplied.
- 4. Students will be allocated an instrument from one of their choices, all factors including providing a balanced ensemble will be taken into consideration. Parents will receive a Congratulations email with details of instrument selection.

Start reading now!





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Online entries are now open for the 2022 NSW Premiers Reading Challenge. Students in Years 7, 8, 9, and 10 are eligible to enter.

Whilst the poster does encourage students to start reading now, some students may be unaware that titles read from the end of the 2021 Challenge can count towards the 2022 Challenge. If they have been keeping a reading log, they can determine what titles are eligible, enter this reading information online now, and continue to read and enter their reading record online until the end of the Challenge.

Students can select titles from the following three booklists. However, the expectation is that students attempt to read books at their ability, to challenge themselves to read books that personally challenge them, and to read more widely than they normally would to expose them to more genres and writing styles.







Note that the 9+ booklist will likely contain titles with more mature themes and content.




A Friendly Reminder





So many new ebooks (including NSW PRC titles) and audiobooks to check out in the STHS Wheelers eLibrary!




New book focus: The joy of x by Steven Strogatz

Troubleshooting Guide

Limit your use of smart mobile phones whilst at school.

SCHOOL SHIRT

- Junior sky blue with short or long sleeves
 - Senior white with short or long sleeves

SHIRTS ARE TO BE WORN TUCKED IN

SCHOOL BLAZER

 The maroon blazer is COMPULSORY as the OUTER GARMENT for warmth all year

SCHOOL SHOES

- Black lace up leather shoes, not suede
 - Sport shoes are not acceptable
 - Shoes with impervious uppers are required for Science and Technology Rooms

SCHOOL CAP

Optional school cap - black with school lettering

SCHOOL TIE

- Junior maroon and sky blue striped tie
- Senior maroon tie with STHS crest
 - Music Performing Ensemble Tie

SCHOOL JUMPER

- Maroon jumper with STHS crest
- The school jumper is never worn as an outer garment - the jumper can be worn underneath the blazer for extra warmth

SCHOOL TROUSERS

- College worsted mid-grey long or short
- Permanent press polyester shorts OK
 - Cord or drill material is not OK
 - Button or zip but not elastic
 - Belts should be black or grey

SCHOOL SOCKS

- Short grey socks with long pants
- STHS school grey long socks pulled up knee high with shorts

UNIFORM INFRACTIONS

- Three uniform infractions per term = 1 Friday Detention
- Six uniform infractions per term = 2 Friday Detentions
- Nine uniform infractions per term = Formal Warning of Suspension

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SCHOOL NOTICES

OFFICE HOURS

The School Office is open for from 8:15am.

PAYMENTS

Payments by students should only be made between **8:15am and 1:15pm** and only before school, at Recess and at Lunch, not during lessons. Payments from students will not be taken after the bell has gone at the end of lunch.

Preferred payments by parents (and the most efficient method) is the payment link in the school generated emails sent with Statements of Account or event notification emails.
